You may find yourself using square and rectangular frames for your photos, using circles and ovals for objects, or playing with geometric shapes as focal points in a picture. \*\*Contrast:\*\* If your image lacks contrast, the viewer's eye will be drawn more to the darker areas of an image than to the lighter areas. Make sure that the contrast in your images is consistent, from darkest to lightest areas, and that the contrast between those areas is even throughout the image. \*\*Highlights:\*\* The highlights of a photo consist of the areas that are most brightly lit. If you don't have enough highlights in an image, it looks underlit. \*\*Background:\*\* The background should be a light, neutral color to avoid drawing the eye to it and making it a dominant feature in a photo. If you have a blue sky as the background, for example, you should try to limit the amount of blue in your images. Instead, use the sky as an accent in a photo rather than a prominent feature. The following list explains all the options: • The Sharpness settings Sharpen sharpening Image editing software like Photoshop Elements can do a decent job on sharpening your images. On the other hand, you may want to use Photoshop Elements to remove some of the 'digital noise', which is the little bumps in the image. To remove the digital noise in Photoshop Elements, you need to go to Enhance > Adjust Noise and then select Smooth. With this option selected, Photoshop Elements will remove some of the jagged lines in your images. 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Q: How to assign input value to base class variable inside derived class when the variable declaration is protected? I have a base class. I want to use this base class in a derived class. The base class has a variable that I want to assign a value to in the derived class but when trying to access the variable in the derived class, it is not accessible (the variable is declared protected and it is in the base class) - I want to avoid having to make the variable public. How can I assign a value to this variable? class BaseClass { protected: int \_var; public: void setVars() { // Do some things \_var = "something"; } } class DerivedClass : public BaseClass { // It seems that the variable in the base class \_var is "protected" and not accessible BaseClass \*derivedClass; // Public function void setVars() { // Using \*derivedClass, how can I assign \_var to a value? derivedClass->\_var = "something"; } } A: There is no way to access a protected variable from inside a derived class, you can only access a protected method. So you can't even use access control (e.g. private) in a derived class to hide the method from the derived class. ### What's New in the?

Q: What is the harm of taking the last number out of a cross-section? I have read some answers explaining why  $\text{S}^{\text{P}}\text{I}\text{S}$ -testing is almost never used to check whether a series converges (or diverges). The answers explain why it is risky to take the  $\$n\$$ th number out of a cross-section of a series, but don't explain the harm of taking the last number out. Could someone explain this? A: Consider the series  $\sum_{n=1}^{\infty} (-1)^n \frac{1}{n^2+n}$ . This is convergent. In fact it is even convergent in the sense of Cesaro summation. This series is in fact a convergent series; but despite that, you can consider it as almost convergent. To do so, you have to consider only the first  $\$m\$$  terms of the series to obtain a sufficient approximation to the value of the series. That is, you consider the approximation  $\sum_{n=1}^{\infty} \left( (-1)^n \frac{1}{n^2+n} \right) = 1 - \frac{1}{4} + \frac{1}{9} - \frac{1}{16} + \frac{1}{25} - \dots$ . After this consideration, the value of the series becomes  $1 - \frac{1}{4} + \frac{1}{9} - \frac{1}{16} + \frac{1}{25} - \dots$ , but the value of the partial sum is  $0$ , so the series isn't convergent. But consider the  $\$m\$$ th partial sum of the series  $S_m = \sum_{n=1}^m (-1)^n \frac{1}{n^2+n}$ . Note that the  $\$m\$$ th partial sum is always positive. But this partial sum is not the  $\$m\$$ th term of the series, but it is the  $\$m\$$ th partial sum of the series. In fact,  $\sum_{n=1}^{\infty} (-1)^n \frac{1}{n^2+n}$ .
